

BOOK_FILM_EDITION

Summer 2011 ended with an empty larder. After gathering food for one year, the Vorratskammer (Pantry) was filled with produce made in Berlin and its hinterland. Everything was eaten during a five day Festival on Culture and Sustainability in Berlin. 5000 guests were expected and 8000 came. The book and film document the filling and emptying of the pantry. Like store cupboards they are filled with a range of facts, images and concepts about food production.

The 150-page publication is designed by Kristina Brusa, Leipzig (D) and is

published by $\frac{\text{argobooks}}{\text{constant}}$, Berlin (D) and $\frac{\text{Jap Sam Books}}{\text{Books}}$, Heijningen (NL). The 45minlong documentary film made in collaboration with Martin König, Berlin. The book, film and a 240 cm x 160 cm "Es gibt was da ist" specially woven linen tablecloth are available as a special edition.

The book and film were launched at Haus der Kulturen der Welt in Berlin, during "Summer in the NAi" in Rotterdam and Agrocite/R-urban in Colombe, Paris.


The Eco Nomadic School is a continuation of $\frac{\text{Rhyzom}}{\text{continuation}}$, a pan-European

MYVILLAGES AT TENT

Rotterdam, NL

During five days in October 2011 we presented a programme of trips, talks, food, a shop and exhibition. Highlights include the trip to Rijk Zwaan's 50 000 sq ft green house for growing (or engineering) 20 types of tomatoes, a Village Brunch, the Farmer's Medley Media Corner and a presentation by Martin Oosthoek, shepherd, on highway and canal landscaping with Rotterdam sheep.



INTERNATIONAL VILLAGE SHOP

The shop is going strong, with branches run by Wapke at TENT and during "Als die Wälder auf Reisen gingen" at <u>Kunstverein Pforzheim</u> (curated by Robert Eikmeyer and Bettina Schönfelder), selling shop classics, fresh vegetables and some "Schwarzwaldglück". In spring we had a one-day-shop run by Antje's students at the University of Hildesheim, and Kathrin's "<u>shop in a shop</u>" version at Kunstmuseum Thurgau for the "10 000 Hours" exhibition (curated by Dorothee Messmer)opened in May for five months. A permanent shop is now on at Gasthaus Timmer, the local pub in the village Ohne, which specialises in Vechtewaren. A very good pub by the way.

New products are coming in from all directions.



Kathrin made <u>TINNED CLAY</u> dug in Höfen. Antje's students asked if they could have the International Village Shop as part of the Theatre Festival Transeuropa in Hildesheim for which they developed a **EUROPEAN SOAP**. Their special technique for being shopkeepers was to record Antje's stories about all the goods, and learn them by heart. Impressive!

Antje signed a seven year contract to invent and produce new goods in the Duchy of Bentheim in far west Germany. This is a commission by Raumsichten - Kunstwegen, a

public realm sculpture project. Together with Thomas and villagers from Ohne, they grew linseed on a field in the village centre. It was harvested, processed and is now turned into OHNER LEINEN (linen). Because 100 were people involved and the actual labour exceeding everyone's expectations there is nothing to be sold. What they made they kept. However, another item from the VECHTEWAREN range, beauti-fully embroidered boiler suits are for sale in the shop.

Kathrin is working with staff from the Kartause Ittingen estate on a new $\underline{\text{ITTINGER}}$ $\underline{\text{WARE}}$ to be launched and named on 30^{th} October, using hop-fibre, secret chambers and a collective outdoor clay firing.

BIBLIOBOX

The Bibliobox has also been traveling quite a bit last year.

It first went up North to the "Mobile Solutions" exhibition at the Mackintosh Museum at the Glasgow School of Art (curated by Jenny Browning). Then to the small village of Kravínin in the Czech Republic for a festival of rural art, culture and ecology, organised by Lenka Dolanova and the yo-yo group. A local cabinetmaker copied the Bibliobox and doubled its archive and display size to make space for the 107 documents on rural art projects that have been collected so far. Until the end of October the Bibliobox is at the "Hungry City" exhibition at Kunstraum Kreuzberg (Künstlerhaus Bethanien) in Berlin (curated by Anne Kersten).

After traveling and opening the box at 37 rural locations since 2005, we think the box might be ready to go public in some big town art spaces to let urban art audiences know what is going on in the rural.

GOING ABROAD (for more than a few days)

LUCAS ARTISTS RESIDENCY PROGRAM

MONTALVO ARTS CENTRE, CA February and March we stayed in Silicon Valley. Wapke had a studio house. Antje, Thomas and Iwan worked just two minutes uphill in a second house. Every evening deer came to graze, some black widows and a pregnant bobcat (no photos unfortunately). We enjoyed great dinners cooked by Niki Ford, and the days were spent working hard on the Vorratskammer book. But enough time was left to visit local farmers, plant some beetroot and visit Fieldfaring and Future Farmers in San Francisco.




Lucky us, we are invited back to think about a new project.

GOING EAST

Wapke went to Zvizzchi in Russia for three weeks, a small village with just over 150 residents, where the ambitious new Nikola-Lenivets Park is popping up next field. Plans for the park include a brand new farm, a camping site, a seminar hotel and artist residencies. Wapke spent her time talking and walking around Zvizzchi, to collect local knowledge and spotting produce. "Made in Zvizzchi" is a project which starts with six postcards from the village. Two are already chosen, and in 2013 the project will be developed further with the support of AIRteam, the Mondriaan Fund and curator Georgy Nikich.

I LIKE BEING A FARMER... SPANISH VERSION

Antje and Thomas thought that "I like being a farmer ..." was finished as a project, but it turned out not to be that simple because they like it too much. This summer they spent four weeks in the district of Enkarterri in the Basque country, on invitation by Campo Adentro. They were collaborating with three farmers and their families - Ana, dedicated to growing the famous red onions of Zalla, Gorka, a farmer without a farm, and the Isusi brothers with their four wheel drives and dogs high up in the mountains, where their flocks live surrounded by wolves and vultures. The results are currently on show at the "Hungry City" exhibition in Kunstraum Kreuzberg in Berlin, and during November in the village hall of Güenes, Enkarterri, Spain.
